Thank you for participating in the ArtsVote Niagara 2011 survey. We are very interested in your views relating to culture and government. Your survey responses will be graded, made public, and widely distributed throughout Niagara prior to the upcoming election in the local media, newspapers and online.

The survey should take about 10-15 minutes. It is comprised primarily of multiple choice questions – the answers provided may not perfectly reflect your view or sensibility but choose the answer that most closely represents your view. You may add comments at the end of the survey.

The results will be tabulated and each candidate will be assigned a grade based on their survey answers. A separate evaluation will be undertaken of party platforms and cultural policies.
